Key Texts: 1 Corinthians 11:23-26

Questions for Reflection and Discussion

1. (0:00-3:50) What words would you use to describe the Lord's Supper?

2. (3:50-8:20) Ponder the resemblance between the lambs mentioned in these texts: John 1:29; 1 Corinthians 5:7; and 1 Corinthians 11:23-26.

3. (8:20-13:55) How were lambs prepared for Passover in Jerusalem during the first century? Is this just a coincidence? If not, what would you call it?

4. (13:55-18:00) In Jeremiah 31, God promises a new covenant. In 1 Corinthians 11:23-26 Jesus speaks of a new covenant in His blood. Is this simply a coincidence?? If not, what is it?

5. (18:00-23:45) In the Old Testament, how often is the Passover associated with revival? Here are all the references that describe a Passover celebration.
 - A. Exodus 12. 1446 BC. God delivers the Hebrews from slavery in Egypt.
 - B. Numbers 9. One year later, when the Lord's glorious presence fills the tabernacle.
 - C. Joshua 5. 1406 BC, as God prepares them to conquer the Promised Land.
 - D. 2 Chronicles 35:18. When Samuel called the people to renewed faith.
 - E. 2 Chronicles 30 mentions Passover during King Hezekiah's revival.
 - F. 2 Kings 23 mentions Passover during King Josiah's revival.
 - G. Ezra 6. Revival and Passover after the Jews return from exile in Babylon.

6. (23:45-29:00) Read 2 Corinthians 5:21. How does God break through yet again when Jesus celebrates Passover?

7. What difference does it make to you to see the Lord's Supper in terms of renewal, revival, and breakthrough of God's power to change lives?

8. Read 1 Corinthians 11:23. To whom will you pass on what you have learned today?
